

Whole School Activities

The following slide provides a number of ideas for whole school activities surrounding Orange Shirt Day.

Whole School Activity Ideas



- Provide students with an Orange Shirt template and have them write on it what Orange Shirt Day means to them.
- Provide students with an Orange Shirt template and have them write on it what it means to care.
- Display shirts in a hallway or entrance of the school.
- Do an acknowledgement on the morning announcements for Orange Shirt Day.
 - Construction paper, felt, or other craft material t-shirts can also be dropped-off at the Board Office. They will be taken to Child and Family Services to hang around the sacred fire. Please drop off t-shirts no later than Monday, September 27th.

It's important to be mindful when purchasing items for Orange Shirt Day/National Day for Truth and Reconciliation (September 30th, 2021). I encourage everyone to purchase from Indigenous peoples or Indigenous owned businesses. This is a great way to show solidarity and support Indigenous creators.

Be aware that some corporations, organizations, and businesses are selling Orange Shirt Day items with no commitment or proceeds going to Indigenous communities or Residential School survivors. Do your research prior to purchasing anything.

Important Tips

The following slide provides some important tips for engaging with Residential School content.

Be Mindful

- Always watch the video in advance of showing it to students to ensure it is age-appropriate.
- When possible, try to use videos created by survivors of Residential Schools. This allows for an authentic voice in the classroom while not asking survivors to re-traumatize themselves by sharing their stories repeatedly.
- Do not call on students who self-identify to talk or tell the story of their family/speak on behalf of all Indigenous peoples.

The following slide discusses the importance of actively participating in truth and reconciliation, every day. These are suggestions on what adults/educators can do.

Truth and Reconciliation, Every Day

What can you, as a teacher, do beyond Orange Shirt Day to engage in truth and reconciliation?

- 1. Read books about the residential school experience.
- 2. Volunteer with Indigenous organizations and not-for-profits.
- 3. Support Indigenous artists.
- 4. Watch Indigenous films and documentaries.
- Attend Indigenous events that are open to the public in your community.
- Learning greetings in the Indigenous language(s) of your community.
- 7. Listen to Indigenous podcasts and music.
- 8. Learn the true history of what is now known as Canada.
- 9. Work towards meaningful allyship.
- 10. Donate to Indigenous communities, causes, etc.
